



WELCOME

I'm pleased to be able to start with some good news. Before the expiry date of this brochure, you will have a more comfortable experience attending shows at The Queen's Hall. We listened to the feedback you provided in our evaluation survey last year and are **replacing the red chairs in the stalls and the cushions on the pews**. This has been made possible thanks to the generosity of our Supporters. We are keen to adapt areas of the Hall to the needs of our audiences, whilst retaining the unique and intimate atmosphere you so clearly love.

Having spent much of 2019 celebrating the past forty years, we now **look forward** to the continued development of **new music strands**, which have found space alongside our traditional, folk, jazz, classical and pop offering. The Queen's Hall Associate Artist, **Michael Begg** unveils his astonishing new collective, the **Black Glass Ensemble** in the first of four events on **Thu 13 Feb** and **Sun 10 May** (p6). Occupying the liminal space between **contemporary classical** and experimental music, the ensemble comprises Scotland's foremost chamber musicians and pioneers of the UK's avant-garde electronic underground.

We have the first Scottish proper gig for popular Americana group, **The Dodge Brothers** on **Sun 22 Mar** (p17). Film critic **Mark Kermode** on double bass will start the evening talking about his latest book *How Does It Feel?* before his bandmates join him to raise the roof off QH. They come to us hot on the heels of their performance at the Hippodrome Silent Film Festival and on **Sat 14 Feb** we screen a HippFest film on tour here, the 1922 version of *Rob Roy* with live accompaniment by multi-instrumentalist and composer David Allison (p7).

There's not enough space to write at length about the rest of this season's programme, but I urge you to watch out for Martin Hayes (Fri 6 Mar, p12), A Giant on the Bridge (Thu 9 Apr, p25), Spiro and Synergy Vocals (Sat 25 Apr, p30), Alexander McCall Smith's collaboration on *The Tumbling Lassie* and *Dandie Dinmont* (Thu 28 May, p38) and of course a very welcome return for George Hinchcliffe's Ukulele Orchestra of Great Britain (Fri 29 May, p38).


Judy Collins + support by Jonas Fjeld

In the 1960s, with her sublime vocals, Judy Collins evoked the idealism and determination of a generation united against social and environmental injustices. Five decades later, new generations bask in the glow of her iconic 56-album body of work, and heed inspiration from her spiritual discipline to thrive in the music industry for half a century.

The award-winning singer-songwriter is esteemed for her imaginative interpretations of traditional and contemporary folk standards and her own poetically poignant compositions. Tonight she will highlight new material from *Winter Stories* featuring critically acclaimed Norwegian folk artist Jonas Fjeld. Standout songs from this project include Collins' own *The Blizzard* and Joni Mitchell's *River*.

Felix Mendelssohn: String Octet in E-flat major George Enescu: Octet for Strings in C major

Although written for just eight instruments, both of these sophisticated works have the drama, richness and depth of a full-blown symphony. They also make for an excellently contrasting pair. From Mendelssohn's exuberant opening bars, we're swept through music that is impressively complex yet captivatingly, joyously melodic throughout, whilst Enescu's is moody, breathlessly dramatic and, in parts, simply volcanic.

Ute Lemper: *Rendezvous with Marlene*

Rendezvous with Marlene is based on a 3-hour phone call between Dietrich and Ute Lemper in 1988. After receiving the French Molière Award for her performance in Cabaret in Paris, Ute sent a postcard to Marlene, apologizing for the media attention comparing them. Ute was at the beginning of her career, whereas Marlene looked back on a long, fulfilled life of movies, music, incredible collaborations, love stories and stardom. During the call, Marlene talked about this life, her work and style, her love for the poet Rilke, her complicated relationship with Germany, her sorrow and her fascinations.

"There are many portraits of Marlene out there, but this one is coming from my heart. Audiences are in for an incredible story; history, fate, courage, style, politics, glamour and sex, talent and a huge career." (Ute Lemper)


Classic Rock Show

Black Glass Ensemble

New Music Scotland Award winner, and The Queen's Hall Associate Artist, Michael Begg unveils his astonishing new collective, the Black Glass Ensemble. Black Glass combines the cream of Scotland's chamber players with longstanding pioneers of the UK's avant-garde electronic underground.

The result is an emotionally resonant new music challenging the senses, confounding expectations and breaking new sonic ground. Familiar chamber instrumentation is augmented with live real-time feeds from satellite and weather monitoring systems, and various atmospheric receivers and recordings, all crackling and groaning with increasing urgency.

On **13 February**, Black Glass break cover and summon us to Arise from the twilight, with support from Glasgow-based Irish composer - and Liminal Nights performer - Linda Buckley. Returning on **10 May** to bring us yet closer to their vision of solastalgia, the group will be joined by special guest Colin Potter, 'a central figure in the UK's DIY and post-industrial underground since the late 70s' (Red Bull Music).

Rob Roy with live accompaniment by David Allison

This impressive and rarely screened biopic of one of Scotland's best-known outlaws, stars David Hawthorne in full tartan kilt and tammy and tells the story of the MacGregors in the early 18th century. Shot entirely on location in the Trossachs and nearby Stirling Castle, the film makes liberal use of Scots for the intertitles ("dinnae fash yersel") and includes epic fight scenes, with over 800 men of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders enlisted as extras in a dramatic battle.

At the opening of the film, screenwriter Alicia Ramsev explains via the first intertitle that this is not an adaptation of Sir Walter Scott's novel, but the story of the principal events in the life of the famous outlaw ("To Scotland, not to Scott, did we go for the facts..."). Never prone to letting these "facts" get in the way of a good story, the film is a gleeful adventure yarn with a strong romantic streak.

Multi-instrumentalist and composer, David Allison, will accompany the film with a new score commissioned by the Hippodrome Silent Film Festival. David has created a number of successful live soundtracks for silent films, including The Island Tapes and The St Kilda Tapes which toured internationally and sold out at festivals such as Celtic Connections. David has also produced three solo studio albums: Reporting, Guitar Gi-tar and Acoustic Movies.

Mairi Campbell and The Pendulum Band

Scottish folk singer and musician Mairi Campbell is a national treasure. Originally trained as a classical musician, she moved into traditional music with her husband David Francis and they became famous through performing the original version of *Auld Lang Syne* at the Kennedy Centre and in the film of *Sex And The City*. More recently she played the viola, acted and danced in her *Auld Lang Syne* show at the 2019 Edinburgh Festival Fringe to great acclaim.

In tonight's show Mairi performs with The Pendulum Band: Su-a Lee (cello), Nicky Haire (violin), Duncan Lyall (bass), Innes Watson (guitar) and William Jaquet (drums). Mairi also has three backing singers, led by her daughter Ada Francis with Megan Savage and Frankie Hay. Expect to hear tracks from *Pulse* and *Auld Lang Syne* plus the occasional acoustic ones as well.



Martin Hayes is regarded as one of the most significant talents to emerge in the world of Irish traditional music. His unique sound, his mastery of his chosen instrument - the violin - his acknowledgement of the past and his shaping of the future of the music, combine to create a formidable artistic intelligence. He has drawn inspiration from many musical genres, but remains grounded in the music he grew up with in East County Clare. He has a unique ability to place the tradition within a wider contemporary context, creating a unique and insightful interpretation of Irish music.

Martin Hayes' soulful interpretations are recognized the world over for their exquisite musicality and irresistible rhythm. He has toured and recorded with guitarist Dennis Cahill for over twenty years, with whom he performed for President Obama in March, 2011.

Martin has collaborated with extraordinary musicians in the classical, folk and contemporary music worlds including Bill Frisell, Ricky Skaggs and Brooklyn Rider and the Irish Chamber Orchestra as well as many of the greatest traditional Irish musicians over the past thirty years. He has performed with Sting and Paul Simon, recently recorded with Yo Yo Ma's Silk Road Project and has contributed music to modern dance, theatre, film and television. Hayes was recently announced as Cultural Ambassador by the Irish Government.



The Dodge Brothers



The Dodge Brothers are renowned for playing the hell out of classic Americana. Described as "wonderful stuff" by Radio 2 presenter Bob Harris, they play an exuberant hybrid of country blues, rockabilly, jugband and skiffle.

Firmly rooted in these traditions they bring to them a freshness that has feet stomping and hands clapping from California to Cropredy, from the Mississippi to the New Forest. Their songs feature vocal virtuosity and heartfelt harmonies underpinned by joyous guitars, thumping double bass and rattlin' snare and washboard. Their music has an authentically American tang – lead guitarist/vocalist Mike Hammond was raised in Alabama and his youthful musical travels took him all over the southern and western USA – but with a strong British perspective from *Culture Show* presenter and film critic Mark Kermode.

Mark will start the evening talking about his book *How Does It Feel?* and will be joined on stage for the second half by the rest of the band for rockabilly, jugboard & skiffle that will lift the roof off The QH. The Dodge Brothers features Mike Hammond (lead guitar, lead vocals, banjo), Mark Kermode (bass, harmonica, vocals), Aly Hirji (rhythm guitar, mandolin, vocals) and Alex Hammond (washboard, snare drum, percussion).

We're delighted that the band are joining us hot on the heels of the Scottish premiere of their new live musical accompaniment of the 1930 film *City Girl* at the 10th edition of the Hippodrome Silent Film Festival on Saturday 21 March.
